Kia ora koutou,

Thank you to everyone who responded to the recent 'AskYourTeam' survey during Term 3. This year, we had a strong response rate, with **27.8% of invited whānau** participating, alongside **85.7% of students**.

The survey's purpose is to understand what's working well in our school and where we can improve. With similar questions asked each year, we can also track progress over time.

Key Insights

Overall, the survey results reflect positive sentiment across our school community. Whānau responses averaged **85%** and students **78%**. We are pleased to see high scores in areas such as student enjoyment, community reputation, cultural inclusivity, and student safety.

For example, **91% of whānau** reported that their child enjoys being part of the school, and **88%** feel that the teachers believe in their child's success. Similarly, **90%** noted that the school actively encourages whānau involvement, which aligns with our commitment to fostering a strong community connection.

Student feedback highlighted that **88%** believe our school is a good school, and **87%** enjoy being part of it. Additionally, **84%** understand the school's values and try to follow them, with a similar percentage believing that their teachers are invested in their success and regularly check their progress.

We note that, the way the scoring works, it doesn't mean that the remaining % does not agree with the statement. A score of 100% would mean that every respondent "strongly agreed", and 80% means that, on average, respondents "agree".

Areas for Growth

At the lower end of the scores from whānau, we scored **79%** in relation to the question 'the school actively seeks ideas and suggestions on how to improve the school.' Likewise, for the question, 'the school keeps me well informed about my child's progress,' we scored **81%**. While these are still very positive scores, we also know that, for some parents, these are areas where we can continue to improve.

Next Steps

We are committed to addressing the feedback we've received. In response to the survey results, we will focus on:

- Enhancing Communication: This year we introduced 'AskYourTeam' sessions to kick-start the year, and refined our 'Share the Learning', parent interview, and reporting processes. Our teachers also continued to have more regular meetings and engagement with whanau of children requiring extra support. Moving forward, we will refine these efforts to provide even clearer and more timely updates to whānau.
- **Creating More Opportunities for Input:** We will also explore ways to increase opportunities for whānau to provide feedback and suggestions. While we welcome feedback at any time through our open-door policy with teachers, the leadership team, the principal, and the Board, we will also look at creating more formal channels to ensure whānau voices are heard.

We appreciate everyone who took the time to share their thoughts. Your feedback helps guide our decisions as we work to provide the best possible learning environment for all our tamariki.

Community Involvement Survey 2024 St Joseph's Catholic School Takapuna

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
How Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagree Likert scale questions are scored



Each response on this scale contributes a score as outlined below. The responses are then averaged to give your overall question score as a %. For example, if 5 people selected 'Strongly Agree' and 5 people selected 'Strongly Disagree' the score would be 50%

5 x Strongly Agree responses at 100% = 500% \mid 5 x Strongly Disagree responses x 0% = 0%

Score = 500% / 10 responses = 50%



What's working well - Whānau/Parents




My child enjoys being part of the school: High enjoyment levels among students indicate a positive school culture. This can enhance student engagement and motivation. Enjoyment in school is linked to better academic and social outcomes.

The school actively encourages opportunities for parents, whānau and caregivers to participate in the life of the school: Encouraging parental involvement shows the school's commitment to community engagement. This can lead to better student outcomes. It also strengthens the relationship between the school and families.

The school has a good reputation in the community: A good reputation in the community reflects well on the school's overall performance. It can attract more students and resources. This reputation is built on consistent quality and trust.

I am aware of and support the school's values: Parents' awareness and support of the school's values suggest strong communication. This alignment helps in creating a cohesive community. It fosters a positive environment for students.

My child feels safe at school: The high score indicates that the school provides a secure environment. This is crucial for students' well-being and academic success. Feeling safe allows students to focus better on their studies.

What needs some work - Whānau/Parents



The school actively seeks ideas and suggestions on how to improve the school: The school may not be effectively engaging with the community for feedback, which could limit its growth and innovation.

The school has mutually beneficial relationships with the local lwi: The school might not be fostering strong relationships with the local lwi, which could affect cultural inclusivity and community support.

The school keeps me well informed about my child's progress: Parents may feel inadequately informed about their child's progress, potentially impacting their engagement and support for the school.

The school will do something if I tell them my child is being bullied: There might be concerns about the school's responsiveness to bullying, which could affect student safety and well-being.

There is a clear focus on effective teaching at the school: There may be a perception that the school lacks a strong focus on effective teaching, which could impact educational outcomes.
